Last week both Vitor and Aline trusted Christ as Savior. José was ecstatic! This week he



told me how he was telling his friends about Jesus. One of them has been struggling and asked if José knew someone who

could "cure" him. José said, "I don't know about a healer, but I know a God!" Then he recently told me that he doesn't know all the verses about evangelizing someone, but he knows how they can hear them so he said,

"I'm gonna bring 'em and God's gotta save 'em!" In Bible college our president Graham Lewis used to say, "Well, glory!" It has been a fruitful first couple of months of the year. I have been traveling much helping CTMBC

and had the privilege to take a group of our young people on two trips to the training



center. We went in January to help with projects. We went again for the Bible conference there where I hurt my hand. We visited at the beginning of March to help evangelize. These trips have ignited an excitement in our young people to serve the Lord and they want to do more. God has also been working in the church here not just in the salvation decisions, but in the spirit of the congregation and attendance. We pray this continues and the Lord blesses. 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## In Her Words - Cynthia Dickens

#10 To remember to care the right way - the way that pleases God

The Lord has given me a vivid imagination, and as with everything, Satan is pleased when I choose to use it for things that do not draw me closer to the Lord. Such as ... worrying about the things that have gone or may go wrong instead of trusting that God truly is working all things for good (not necessarily the world's definition of "good" but, rather, a Biblical definition). Or ... imagining other's intentions and meanings as bad or selfish or immature rather than bringing into captivity to HIM every one of my thoughts, intentions, and motives (after all, I cannot control anyone else's). Or ... becoming so invested in another's life that their missteps and lack of fellowship with God are viewed by me as my own failure.

Frequently, even though we may work to do what is Biblical in the face of others' seeming disregard, some things that I've found to be true are as follows:

- It's easy to get sidetracked by the disbelief, discouragement, or even anger that comes with watching a loved one family, friend, or other to whom we're ministering go astray from the Lord's will.
- It's easy to feel responsible when a loved one makes a bad choice, including feeling guilt over having not prayed "the right way" or having not offered to them the "love and support" needed. Sometimes the person in error even levels such accusations, making the guilt that much weightier.

When those very human and mistakenly-deemed-noble feelings overtake me, what should my response be? How do I care the right way? While this discipline is something that I'm certainly still learning, some appropriate responses, that God has led me to, include:

- Immerse myself in the truth of God's Word. It will never point my walk or my emotions to the wrong path.
- Remind myself that each one of us is responsible to God for our decisions. While no one else will answer for me, I, too, will not stand before Him for someone else. When I've done what God has asked of me, there is no righteousness in blaming myself for someone else's decisions.
- Run to God for comfort and support. Only He is enough. Only He can truly help me wrangle the human
  emotions that, at times, threaten to drown me. I can, in His presence, mourn another's choices and be sure
  that His own grief far exceeds mine.
- Continue to love and pray for the person/people in question. While the weight of their choices is not mine to bear, it is my privilege to carry them and my care for them to the Lord. Again, He is enough for me and for them. May I never be so arrogant so as to not pray for someone who has betrayed my care for them! I, too, betray Jesus Christ's care for me, when I choose wrong; and He never abandons me.

Whatever situation I'm facing, I find it extremely important to evaluate my own behavior before others and my input to their lives; because my actions and conversations may very well affect them and their decisions. I ought not take the above attitudes without, at the same time, allowing God to show me where I should change to glorify Him. No, I'm not responsible for others' decisions; but I must not allow a haughty or self-righteous attitude to replace the care that God would have me exhibit for others and for my influence in their lives.

Some things that I find myself repeating in prayer before the Lord are "Lord, you know what he/she needs, and only You can BE what he/she needs" along with "Lord, please, give them what You know they need in order to be what You want them to be." Despite my deep love in Christ for someone, my perspective on and care for their life is not as perfect as that which my loving God has. By trusting Him (and working to follow Him), my care for others will be far more effective than if I follow my human instincts for what it means to care.

And isn't that what brings peace in any situation? True and complete trust? Trust to listen to my Lord, to talk to Him, to follow Him, to rest in Him. No person (and certainly no power or thing!) can offer me true peace. But my glorious Lord and Savior Jesus Christ not only can, but does offer ... oh, so perfect peace! Isaiah 26:3

Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee.
